

The faces of five kings in the Mycenae burial chambers were covered with masks of gold or electrum (a metal made of gold and silver). To make the mask, the metal was heated, then beaten into shape. Experts believe these masks were attempts at real portraits of the kings. The most famous

one, shown here, is often named after Agamemnon, the legendary king in Homer's tale of the Trojan War (see pages 164-165). But, sadly, it can't really be Agamemnon himself. The mask dates back to about 1550BC, but the Trojan War, if it happened, took place later - around 1250BC.
